# What's the name of the mountain north of Cascadel Woods?

Looming about 3,000 feet above Cascadel Woods to the north is Peckinpah Mountain. Other nearby landmarks of the namesake are Peckinpah Meadow and Peckinpah Creek.

A lumber mill set in a meadow bearing his name was operated by Charles M. Peckinpah. He and his brothers started the mill in 1884 and worked it until 1904. The old timber trail, now Peckinpah Road, was the route from North Fork to the mill. It took a full day to make the 3000' climb up a steep incline in a wagon pulled by a twelvemule team.




Many of us know the work of grandson, David Sam Peckinpah. Born in Fresno, he attended Fresno High School and later, Fresno State. Sam Peckinpah worked on his grandfather's ranch among descendants of miners and ranchers living in Coarsegold and Bass Lake. This rough-and-tough time of his life is thought to have been a major influence on Sam Peckinpah's films.

Sam directed notable films, including *Ride the High Country, Major Dundee, The Wild Bunch, The Ballad of Cable Hogue, Junior Bonner, The Getaway, Pat*  *Garrett* and *Billy the Kid,* and *Bring Me the Head of Alfredo Garcia.* Many of these films were international blockbusters.

Scripts for *Gunsmoke*, *Have Gun—Will Travel*, *Broken Arrow*, *and The Rifleman* were among many Sam wrote for TV westerns.

Although Sam lived in a middle class home in Fresno, he spent happy days at the ranch on Peckinpah Mountain and at the family's cabin in Bass Lake riding his horse, Nellie. He said "It was the finest time of my life. There will
