May 6, 2023 is National Firewise Preparedness Day.

The Firewise Brigade members and many volunteers have been very busy clearing away many piles of broken limbs created with the enormous amount of snowfall in February.

On May 6, a couple of the Brigade members and possibly a volunteer or two will be clearing the hydrants of the tall

grasses.

The Shelter in Place is in great shape and ready for the wildfire season.

The roadsides have been cleared of

most of the piles and the CSA area just past the



clubhouse is being cleared of piles by burning.

The road to the CSA Apple Orchard behind the clubhouse

is not usable due to the water flow on this road. This field will be cleared as soon as possible.

Remember to <u>record your hours of clearing debris</u> from your property.

Brushing, piling, and burning are all recordable hours.

If you take a truckload to the dump or a community burn pile, *record the number of truckloads* you had.

When its weedeating time, the hours spent <u>weedeating</u> your property should be recorded as well.

Turn these hours in to Carol Eggink via text 559.676.3783, email egginks@netptc.net, or by landline at 559.877.6290. These hours help us to fulfill the requirements mandated by the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) in order for us to be re-certified.

So far we have turned in 527 hours. This equates to \$15,783.65 in volunteer value.

Cascadel Woods is not a campground.

Every year at this time, people prepare to have friends and family come for a visit. Many consider setting up camp for a few days. And why not? The Woods is a beautiful place to get closer to nature.

But, it's important to remember that abundant wildlife warrants extra consideration for our safety. Many coming from out of the area may not realize that we share the forest with all kinds of wild animals. And a few are predators. Bears roam the woods, as do cougars, coyotes, and rattle snakes.

Being aware of your surroundings is a top priority. And most of the residents do a fine job of that. Just remember to help your visitors to be alert.

As an aside, a quick phone call to Sierra Ambulance confirms that, in the case of a poisonous snakebite, patients will be transported to the nearest hospital in Fresno County by ambulance or helicopter to receive antivenin. For serious pediatric cases, the patient may be taken to Valley Children's Hospital.

Avoiding a rattlesnake bite is a perfect example of the old adage—an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.
